Autumn Leaves and Winter draws on - a good time to reflect on all that's happened during the past few months. Let's begin with a word to the wise - taking a ten day family holiday (Nickie, me and 5 kids in one car in France) a week after moving home which itself came 4 days after International Convention is not a plan you would, in hindsight, describe as 'good' let's get back to the barbershop for some sanity.

Following our Board budget meeting in July, Peter and I attended the Barbershop in Harmony planning meeting on behalf of BABS to continue our involvement in the planning for both this year's mixed Quartet competition (more of this a little later) and the European Barbershop Convention which LABBS will be hosting during their convention weekend in 2017. It is still early days for this event but the plans so far lead me to believe it will be a spectacular weekend.

Harmony College this year was another huge success and showed a different aspect to the college chorus - there were two. The usual 'great fun - big sound' college chorus was led by Duncan Whinyates with talented leadership from Reckless quartet. The second group, a first for HC, was an 'auditioned' chorus. The two songs were challenging to start with and the direction by the outstanding Jack Pinto (International Quartet GOLD with Old School in 2011 and director of 'The Brothers in Harmony' Chorus of New Jersey) was both inspiring and very demanding, prisoners are not taken by Jack. I went to their first session and was highly impressed by the commitment from the whole group. The final performance was definitely a memorable HC moment.

Steve Tramack, MD of the New Hampshire 'Granite Statesmen' chorus, was our other US guest educator and he brought a wealth of knowledge and gave us all a whole bunch of great techniques to make us better singers. If those present on this fabulous weekend apply just half of what they learned we'll be a better organisation all round.

The BABS Autumn Members Meeting (AMM) took place in September. This is the second of two occasions in the year where our membership get to see behind the scenes at what the BABS board is doing to promote our hobby. The AMM this year saw the unveiling of our plan to introduce a Mixed Chorus competition at the end of our Convention next May. More detail for this event will be provided soon – very exciting.

The IABS convention this year was in Castlebar in the west of Ireland. The warm enthusiasm of the Irish never fails to impress and this year was no exception. Shannon Express came a creditable third in the International Chorus contest whilst two young Irish male quartets vied for top honours in their domestic contest. Both quartets scored in the 74% range and were very entertaining - watch out guys the Irish are coming.

The Quartet Prelims had to be moved this year due to the rebuilding of the Birmingham Conservatoire - to be truthful we were a little concerned in case it didn't work out, particularly when the date had to move forward by more than a month. We needn't have worried though - the two day format was a great success and the venue, the Royal Northern College of Music in Manchester, provided tremendous facilities. At the end of the first day we had our new Youth and Seniors champs - Trailblazers and South Parade in that order. Very well done guys. The qualifier for convention next year came out with Finest Hour on top with a terrific 80% average – its going to be a fab convention.

The season finished with a trip to sunny (and warm - yes really) Bournemouth for the 39th LABBS Convention. I thought that the LABBS event was supposed to be an easy weekend for the BABS Chairman? Not so, compering the Friday night show and directing our ladies chorus (Chorus Iceni) on the Saturday it was quite exhausting. Follow that with a part compere job for the first ever Barbershop in Harmony Mixed Quartet competition on the Sunday and it was a full on weekend indeed. Hannah and the Hurricanes won the event and go on to represent the UK barbershop organisations in Germany at next years' 'World Mixed Quartet' championships in Germany - good luck guys.

A busy season indeed and before you can say mince pies it'll be Christmas. Good luck to all those who are having Christmas barbershop events and to you all - a Merry and Harmonious Christmas.

QUARTET COMPETITION

New Prelims Venue Exceeds Expectations

Prelims 2015

When we were informed that the Birmingham Conservatoire would not be available for Prelims this year we were rather worried that we wouldn't be able to find a suitable venue for what has become an important event in the BABS' calendar; needless to say, our Special Events Director, Derek Parmenter, rose to the challenge and identified the Royal Northern College of Music in Manchester as a likely candidate.

After a site visit and some negotiation over the date, we had our new setting. On a couple of occasions in recent years we've had to run two contest stages side by side in order to accommodate so many entries, but at the RNCM we were able to have the one hall from late Saturday afternoon, which enabled the Seniors' and Youth contest to take place that evening, with the remaining competitors singing the following day.

Youth Contest

There were 6 entries in the Youth Contest on the Saturday evening, with "Trailblazers" winning with a score of 72.8%, enabling Alastair Hay-Plumb and Simon Arnott to add another gold medal to the ones previously won with "Park Street" in the 2012 Youth Contest and the 2014 BABS' Quartet Contest. It's also worth mentioning that one of their songs, "Goodbye Yellow Brick Road" was arranged by Simon, the first time that one of his arrangements has been sung on the contest stage. In a very close second place were "Harmonopoly", scoring 71.8%, with "The Perfect Pitchers" in bronze medal position with 69.9%. All three, together with fourth placed "4 On Demand", qualified for the semi-final round at Harrogate next May.

Seniors Contest

This year there were four entries in the Seniors' contest, with "South Parade" winning gold with a score of 69.1%, "Three 'n' Easy" coming second with 68.7% and "YOUTHLESS" third with 64.1%.

National Prelims

Including qualified youth quartets, and it's not a requirement that the youth entries are all BABS' members, there were 29 quartets vying for one of the 16 semi-final places at Harrogate.

Leading the field, with a tremendous score of exactly 80%, were "Finest Hour", our current bronze medallists, the highest score recorded at Prelims in recent years - and possibly at any time!

Four other quartets scored over 71%, and all sixteen qualifying for Harrogate scored over 65%. At Harrogate they will be joined in the semi-finals by "Portobello Road", to whom the Guild of Judges gave a bye in Prelims this year as the rearranged date clashed with the Sweet Adelines International contest in Las Vegas in which the wives of two of their members were competing and they had prearranged flights and registrations. We'll also have some BABS' quartets singing for a qualifying score for the BHS International quartet contest in Nashville next July, "Reckless", "Tagline" and "The Emerald Guard", together with "Hanfris" from Spain and "4 In A Bar" and "The Autotuners" from Ireland. What a prospect that will be - it will probably be the best BABS' quartet contest ever staged.

So, the move to Manchester worked exceptionally well and Prelims will be held there again next year on the 5th and 6th November. Huge thanks to the judges for a monumental task exceptionally well managed, to the stage crew and technical teams, to the large number of spectators who were enthusiastic throughout, and, most importantly, to each and every singer who participated - a truly great job!

Oxford Conference Attended by 35 Barbershop Clubs A successful launch to the Young People in Harmony Programme

YOUNG PEOPLE IN HARMONY

Two years of preparation came to successful conclusion at the King's Centre in Oxford on November 7th, when 35 LABBS & BABS Clubs came together for the launch of the Youth Development Project trial.

Supported by both Boards, the trial is the largest joint project undertaken together and aims to set the foundations for a long-term recruitment programme which should see more people entering our hobby at a younger age, eventually.

Although the interest at Universities is already established and growing, there is a problem before this at secondary level where not enough youngsters are getting involved in singing in the first place and therefore not providing a source of interested and inspired students. Challenged music funding also means many schools are not meeting Government targets for musical attainment.

After lengthy discussion, it has been decided that we, as the two largest a cappella singing organisations in the country, should not stand by and allow this situation to continue. We are sitting on a wealth of talent in the form of educators, arrangers, coaches and musical directors. But, perhaps more importantly, we have 5000 enthusiastic and motivated singers between us, many of whom would welcome the chance to spread the benefits they all get from singing barbershop to a wider, younger audience.

Exactly how we bring our organisations and the music establishment together, effectively, is what the trial is all about.

We started off earlier this year inviting Clubs to appoint a Youth Development Officer who would make contact with schools and music hubs, to establish a series of workshops, coaching sessions, festivals and other activities in support of the singing ambitions and needs locally. They would liaise with other Clubs in their areas and ensure that where necessary, a joint approach would be made by both ladies and men.

Over 50 Clubs volunteered to participate and many are now taking the first challenging steps to establish communication with each other, and the music establishment, locally. Already we are aware of some very interesting relationships developing between Clubs and Schools.



At the launch Seminar itself, delegates heard talks from leading speakers in music education and youth singing who conveyed, in no uncertain terms, how important and valued they regarded this initiative and welcomed our involvement. Delegates were then issued guidelines and 'best practice' information on how to proceed and work together and introduced to a very exciting next step the production of a new music resource pack bringing together arrangements, tags and rehearsal routines geared especially towards a younger audience. This will be available for participating Clubs in 2016 to use when they start working in schools.

The whole Project is being coordinated by Windsor Rackham from the Royal Harmonics with a team consisting of Ashley Baker, the BABS Administration Director, Alison Harbord, the LABBS Special Projects Director, Paul Kaiserman from Spirit of Harmony and recently, the newly appointed LABBS Youth Coordinator, Rebecca (Boo) de Bruin.

Looking Forward to 2016

At our Autumn Members Meeting (AMM) in September we saw that while membership numbers almost reached 2400 at the time of our 40th birthday Convention in 2014, the recent trend, allowing for the usual ups and downs through the year, has actually been much less exciting, such that we are now back to the level of three years ago, around 2250.

More recently an age profile of members tells us that 53% of members are over 65 (30% over 70%), so while no better proof is needed that once hooked you're a Barbershopper for life, and we continue to attract the under 35s, it's the potential in the 35 to 65 bracket which needs to be tapped in a big way, since 15 years ago it accounted for 60% of us, yet today only 39%.

The good news is that the average age of our members has stayed at around 61, and the average age of those new members who have joined us in the last 12 months is 49, which is not only encouraging, but it also shows that we are able to recruit new members in our prime target age group.

The figure on the right confirms what we all know to be the overwhelming importance that the direct influence of members and their clubs has on attracting new members and shows that, while BABS itself can do very little directly, it must develop its role in



Of course, the nature of that assistance may differ between clubs in line with your resources and objectives, and as means and styles of promotion alter. Thus it's vital that you feed back to us what works and what doesn't, and what you've seen other organisations do that just might be worth a try. All to help BABS to spend our subs in ways that bring the biggest bang for our bucks in terms of recruitment.

Before Harmony College, every club received an InTouch email from me asking if it would participate in a National Learn to Sing event over a particular period in the Autumn of 2016 and if such an event would benefit from new branding. By the AMM I'd received only 11 replies so asked the attending club reps to take the question back. No further responses were forthcoming so I'm left to plan 2016 activity on the basis that the 80% who were not in favour of such an event are representative in preferring instead, for a variety of sound reasons, to set their own dates and take advantage of the grant and discount leaflets.



Influence on gaining new members

So no National Learn to Sing during 2016, however the main branding will become "Time To Sing". The usual grant may be applied for and the portfolio of promotional and event support material provided by BABS will be enhanced. For example, all those who've attended Laurie Whittle's Harmony College presentations of the Acorn Demographic Area Analysis System will be pleased to learn that each club will be provided with its own data set in the near future. and so will be equipped to benefit from, perhaps, more appropriate targeting of mailings and publicity.

More on 'Time To Sing in 2016' will be sent to clubs early in the new year, so please ensure that BABS has your club officers up to date contact details.

Latest News from the BABS Music Advice Service

The objectives of the recently announced BABS Music Advice Service team are:

- * Help members find music to suit their needs.
- * Get copies of music for members to preview.
- * Find the owners of copyright in the UK and link that to whoever holds print rights for that music.
- * Provide support to members to work through the above process.
- * Assist in finding learning tracks for members. If needed, purchase on their behalf learning tracks.
- * Where appropriate advise on arrangers fees and how best to pay them.

New Page on BABS Web Site

A new Music page on Singbarbershop.com will be in place early in the new year and will have information relating to each of the above objectives.

In the meantime I have been asked to comment on some exchanges on copyright that are really Myths. For example:

- * It is my understanding that there is no difference between soft and hard copy. You need a print licence or have purchased hard copy to have the required number of copies "in circulation" whatever the means.
- * If you own a legal copy there is no reason why you can't pass it on when you've finished with it as long as the total number of legal copies "in circulation" is not exceeded and it was not licenced specifically for one person or group.



A recent worrying example is that of buying a single copy of the BHS Polecat book download and passing on copies electronically. This is putting more copies than you have a right to in circulation so is a blatant violation of the rules - do not do it.

On the other hand, requesting help from fellow Barbershoppers to find a reference copy of a piece of music or a learning track should be OK as long as it is then licenced properly for use.

Learning tracks are in effect an educational tool (for learning purposes only) so if the tracks were originally purchased legally then there is no problem passing them on electronically as MP3's to enable someone else to learn the song. This was checked with and confirmed by PRS in 2012.

Remember that the penalty for copyright violation can be very large so please take care.



Wight Harmony, based on the Isle of Wight, started their 2015 'Learn to Sing in Harmony' course in September. This was one of the club's most successful courses in terms of singers wishing to continue their training after the six weeks, and also in the level of singing quality of those who attended, partly because we were able to attract a higher proportion with previous singing experience.

Following weeks of promotion, including the local press and radio stations and the distribution of BABS leaflets across the Island, 30 potential singers with ages ranging from teenagers to 60+, attended on the first evening, joining the 30-strong Wight Harmony Chorus.

This settled down to an average of 25 per night over the six week course. Currently 21 singers have signed up to progress to the next stage - an encouraging start and a far greater proportion than on previous courses.

The six weekly sessions, supported by BABS both financially and with publicity and course material, was headed up by Wight Harmony Music Director Dave Bryant supported by voice coach Steve Morris and section leaders Graham Maitland, John Kerr, Nick Gale, and Eric Hoare plus a host of other members assisting in a wide variety of essential roles such as course administration and attendee processing, car park supervision, the riser team, the

audio-visual team, and of course the all important tea & coffee team.

The course followed BABS guidelines for these popular events, and included sessions led by visiting BABS coaches Lucy van de Ven, Mike Taylor and John Palmer. Using the Christmas song 'Winter Wonderland' as the basis for the course, a specific topic was the focus of each week's training including; Posture and Breathing, the Vocal Mechanism, Resonance, Vowels, and Consonants.

For the final week a mini-concert was arranged, which saw twenty-six LTS singers on the risers with the regular Wight Harmony chorus to perform for friends and family who packed our rehearsal church.

Comments about the course were overwhelmingly positive -'Enlightening' 'Very friendly people', 'Informative', 'Excellent', 'Leader and instructors very good', 'Useful to any singer', 'A most enjoyable course', 'Excellent course, very well run and tutored. Wight Harmony is a superb choir, very well run.'

As a departure from previous courses, the chorus is running a free six week extension in order to further encourage retention. In addition to building on the singing and performance techniques learned during the initial course, it will also incorporate songs from our repertoire to accelerate the new singers' progress and facilitate their integration into the main chorus more rapidly. After that they will have the opportunity to join the club and become fully paid-up members of BABS!

Wight Harmony are fortunate to enjoy a high retention of their regular members, and a high turnout at both rehearsals and performances. Inevitably some have to leave due to health, family or employment reasons, and, as with many other choruses, it is vital that new members are attracted to the club.

The Learn-to-Sing Course has proved to be a valuable tool in attracting potential singers to our hobby and generally promoting Barbershop singing and, whilst it involves a lot of hard work by all the club members to make it a success, it is always a lot of fun, a highly rewarding experience, and of great benefit to the on-going success of the club.

Harmony Express December 2015 The Royal Harmonics at the Windsor Festival



Artistically and culturally speaking, mid-September to early October is a busy old time in the town of Windsor. This is the time of The Windsor Arts Festival which aspires to be amongst the premier Music and Arts Festivals in the UK.

It was founded in 1969 and aims to give visitors and residents the opportunity to enjoy high quality cultural events annually in the unique and historic venues of Windsor. It covers the gamut from world renowned musicians performing with leading orchestras in the grand interior of the Waterloo Chamber in Windsor Castle, to performances by local school orchestras. Not just music but art, exhibitions, open houses, plays, talks and walks around Windsor.

Outside of the main events, there is also a Schools' Programme to inspire musical and artistic appreciation and achievement and provide performance opportunities for local children.

Running concurrently with the main festival, the Windsor Fringe Festival (which also began in 1969) was started by a group of people who wanted to present a festival of all the arts at affordable prices. The Fringe are passionate about being a platform for promoting new talent with an eclectic mix of the arts and entertainment: music, drama, comedy, visual arts, film, poetry, informative walks, history and even gastronomy. A highlight is the International Drama Writing Award sponsored by Kenneth Branagh. So imagine how delighted The Royal Harmonics were to be invited to participate in not one of these festivals but both this year!

On September 16th, RHX took to the stage of the premier performance venue in Windsor, The Theatre Royal, to entertain a sizeable and appreciative audience. We shared that stage with The Military Wives of Windsor.

For those of you not familiar with Gareth Malone and the Military Wives Choir, Gareth Malone formed a choir of military wives in 2011 from two army bases in Devon and they learned to sing while their husbands and partners were deployed for a 6 month tour of duty in Afghanistan. Gareth believed music and singing would help the women through a difficult time of worry and separation. He aimed too to give the women a 'voice' and an opportunity to express the emotions and hardships suffered by the wives of serving soldiers. A song was commissioned for the Military Wives Choir, "Wherever You Are", which they sang very movingly in front of the Queen and Royal Family at the Festival of Remembrance at the Royal Albert Hall. The song went on to become the Christmas number one for 2011 raising £500k for military charities. This was such a success that military wives choirs started up across the country.



The Windsor Military Wives choir being one such. On the night, they sang amongst other things popular songs from musicals (Les Mis and Sweet Charity) and of course "Wherever You Are" to close the first half. RHX performed two of our favourite sets - a tour through popular music and a love set. It was a splendid evening enjoyed by performers and audience alike.

Our performance at the Fringe Festival was exactly a week later and although we sang several of the same songs, it had a very different style and feel to it. This performance was held in our rehearsal venue and was very much a rehearsal come performance, where we encouraged participation and aimed to show the audience what our style of music is all about.

In addition to performing, we did a musical warm up, gave a demonstration of how the different voice parts come together to form a quartet, learned a tag for which some of the audience joined us on the risers and JP took us through our paces on a new song to demonstrate how many things we have to work on in pursuit of excellence.

We learned some choreography and treated the audience to a performance from "Putting on the Blitz", a quartet made up of RHX members that specialises in singing wartime songs.



All in all, the evening was a great success with some warm and appreciative feedback from a new audience who really enjoyed the intimate performance and the insight the evening gave them into what we do.

These two events offered RHX a great opportunity to showcase ourselves on home ground and we hope to do more next year.

We have been invited back to the Theatre Royal in March to perform as part of a charity gala and we shall hope once again next year to have the opportunity to perform in one or both Festivals. It's great to be a barbershopper!

Kingsmen Harmony Chorus on Friesland Tour

We met our hosts at a function in the hotel Amicitia in Sneek on the Friday night and afterwards were taken to our respective hosts homes where we were looked after very well. The following morning the guys and ladies had different experiences ranging from a windmill tour, speed skating, boat tour, bike rides to walking the family dog!

The concerts on Saturday night at Da Skans Theatre in Gorredijk and Sunday morning in Ysbrechtum Village hall were played out to packed and enthusiastic audiences. We are particularly endebted to our excellent presenters from within the chorus ranks. John Meehan who had to introduce the song, YMCA without actually saying it! Stuart Newberry who had the audience in fits with his brilliant opening welcome in 'Friesland'!

Charles Grose for his excellent oration of our Jungle Book package and Greg Jarrett for his usual comedic introduction.

And then to the farewell 'Auld Lang Syne', with one of our guys smashing his tot glass when he should have kept it - each one was engraved 'Brothers' in Song' and given to us as a souvenir! And then boarding the coach for our return journey we were treated to the Frisian's version of the Haka! The return journey over the 32km Afsluitdijk (dike) followed by a visit to the World Heritage site of the Wadden Sea was eventful. We couldn't see a thing due to thick fog which actually cleared as we headed into Schipol Airport - but the damage had been done and flights were cancelled/delayed. The unexpected stop over gave the guys a chance to visit Amsterdam and Rotterdam.

All in all a fantastic tour where the delays were all part of the experience!

Harmony Express December 2015 Lest We Forget Anvil Chorus sing at the National Memorial Arboretum



Retired Cricket Umpire, Raconteur and famous Barnsleyan Dickie Bird OBE was the main speaker at the COFEPOW (Children Of Far East Prisoners Of War) 70th Anniversary of VJ Day Commemorative Dinner at the National Memorial Arboretum.

Anvil Chorus were Dickie's warm-up act and brought tears to his eyes with our heartfelt renditions of "Abide With Me" and "I'll Be Seeing You".

Neither the marquee environment nor its loud air conditioning got the better of us although low fabric drapes almost prevented sight of David Williams(back row 2nd left) debut on the risers singing the six songs he learned in four weeks. The members of COFEPOW are the babies and siblings of many thousands of men who died during WW2 on the Sandakan Death Marches, in copper mines in Formosa and steel factories in Japan, building the Thai/Burma and Sumatra railways, roads in Burma and air strips including Java, New Guinea and the Solomons.

Many more died on unmarked 'Hell ships' battened down in the holds or torpedoed by Allied submarines. And the fall of Hong Kong to the Japanese took its toll of both British Servicemen and thousands of Civilians who were interned.

Those who survived to return often continued suffering for years after and many of the charity's members bear testament to their relatives constant nightmares and recurring illnesses.

COFEPOW has established the Far East Prisoners of War Memorial at the National Memorial Arboretum which carries the name and rank of every prisoner taken during the

South East Asia conflict, an unprecedented period in British history.



Cambridge Chord Company is in Safe Hands



After a unanimous vote of confidence from the members of Cambridge Chord Company, Simon Hilton has taken over from Bob Croft as their Musical Director.

In 2007, Bob told the chorus he would direct for five years. After CCC won the Small Chorus Trophy in May, Bob carried out his long stated intention and resigned the directorship, handing over the baton to Simon - only three years late!

As well as winning the Small Chorus Trophy this year (the sixth time in the history of CCC) Bob has steered the chorus to a bronze medal at the European convention, a silver medal at IABS and three silver medals at BABS convention.

Simon, having already been assistant musical director and vocal coach, has hit the ground running at Cambridge with an exciting programme of new music to supplement existing repertoire.

Simon claims to have started singing barbershop in the womb. More substantive evidence shows that he and his father joined the Anvil Chorus in 1980. Eight years later when work took him away from Birmingham he joined Preston Barbershop Harmony Club. On the night he joined Preston, the musical director resigned (no

connection!) "There was a singout arranged for two weeks' time," said Simon. "I mentioned I had directed Anvil in the pub for a few polecats so could help out. All went well so I was offered the position of

musical director!" Under Simon's direction, Preston went from 19 members and 34th place to a chorus of 58 coming 5th at convention (twice).

As well as singing with, directing and coaching quartets and other choruses, Simon has a special enthusiasm for the art and science of vocal craft, something which is dear to the heart of CCC. His team and project management experience in the aerospace industry is already proving very helpful to the chorus, the management of which has been compared with "trying to herd cats."

The chorus, recently expanded by seven new members, is preparing for a Christmas show in Cambridge on 12th December. Check out Events at www.cambridgechordcompany.co.uk for details.

Simon will be ably supported by Steve Green (currently tenor in Reunion, ex Blue Ray, Prime Time, Nickelodeon) as Assistant Musical Director.

As lovers of Barbershop Derek and Jean enjoyed travelling together to BABS Conventions across the UK although in later years periods of illhealth interrupted Derek's full participation in chorus activities.

A particular highlight was TVC's trip to Krakow, Poland. Although that trip was not without its drama for Derek as standing at the airport check-in he suddenly realised he had left his TVC uniform on the bed at home. Fortunately a telephone call to Derek's son and a frantic (but legal) drive to the airport saved the day. Derek stood down from the chorus in October 2012 as his increasing frailty prevented him from participating to the degree that he would have wished.

A particular favourite song of Derek's was the lengthily entitled 'New Ashmolean Marching Society and Students Conservatory Band' sung with gusto by TVC at Harrogate in 2010, Derek's last Convention performance. However it was another favourite, the beautiful June Dale arrangement of 'Can you feel the love tonight', which at Jean's request, the Chorus sang at Derek's funeral service.

A much loved father and grandfather and always a gentleman Derek is going to be greatly missed by all who knew him.

The quartet entered prelims on a number of occasions but never really gained any success, but we all enjoyed it which is what its all about.

John also sang with Gentlemen Songsters/Crescendo, during which time he competed with the chorus in the Sainsbury's Choir of the Year, music festivals in Bangor N.I. and Dudley, and the IABS Convention in Cork.

I don't think he missed many UK conventions over the years, and also attended Harmony College, but having travelled to two International conventions - Montreal 2003 and Salt Lake City 2005 - he always said his highlight was experiencing the 900 strong combined Barbershop chorus and Mormon Tabernacle Choir in Salt Lake City. A memorable moment.

Sadly, John's wife Linda passed away in 2013, but he remained a loving father to his two daughters Suzanne and Debbie and a devoted grandfather to three beautiful grandchildren. John will certainly be missed on the risers, a big man with a big voice – Rest in peace.

OBITUARY BILL RIEHL 1947 - 2015

The Granite City Chorus are saddened to report the passing of Bill Riehl who was MD of the chorus and a prolific quartet member during his stay in Aberdeen from around 1999 to 2006, when he returned to his native America. He called it retiral but from various news sources, it was anything but. A music degree and heavy involvement in the local music scene of Aiken, S Carolina were just a couple of his retiral projects.

An oil industry geologist by profession, Bill and family, wife Pat and children Alex and Spencer arrived in Aberdeen from a stay in the Middle East at an opportune moment as our previous and original MD had intimated retiral due to poor health. Bill was a long time barbershopper who often described his frustrations when posted to places with little of a BBS scene, and willingly took over the helm after a couple of weeks on the risers.

Not one to just take over the helm and sail on as before, the Chorus were caught up in a pretty changeable journey and driven from their comfort zone on more than one occasion. I think folk will agree that you might not always agree with what he was proposing but my goodness, you had to have thought through any objections before voicing them. The instigator of our signature Royal Stewart waistcoats and with a move towards increasing our repertoire of Scottish songs in the BBS style, (well, what else would you expect from an American who loved everything Scottish) we soon made an impact on Convention by winning the Cambridge Scroll for Most Improved Chorus in 2001/2002 at Sheffield and Harrogate.

Not a bad retention rate and a tribute to his teaching style. A Christmas show, a filmed musical with a local ladies chorus, a Doors Open appearance at a local closed theatre (now thankfully re-opened and the scene in November of our 25th Anniversary concert) and a variety of sing-out locations were his legacy to the continuing development of the Granite City Chorus.

He was a special talent and it was a pleasure to be part of the Chorus during his tenure as MD. The sincerest of condolences from the Chorus go out to his family.
